Lucy Fisher – The Daily Telegraph Deputy Political Editor, Journalist and Author Breakout Session: From Putin to Partygate: life as a political journalist

Lucy Fisher is an award-winning journalist and author. She is Deputy Political Editor at The Daily Telegraph and a regular broadcaster on the BBC and Sky News - frequently appearing on the Today programme, Newsnight and Westminster Hour. In March she will move to become Chief Political Commentator at Times Radio.

Previously she was Chief Political Correspondent, then Defence Editor, at The Times. Lucy is currently based in a draughty, mouse-infested office in Parliament, but has reported from around the world, including Brussels and Washington, as well as Afghanistan, Iraq and the Arctic. Her latest book *Women in the War: The Last Heroines of Britain's Greatest Generation* was published by HarperCollins last September.

Amy Kent – Owner of Amy Kent Bespoke Rugs Breakout Session: Being successful in a creative company

Amy always had her heart set on a career in the creative industry. Having studied Art here at St Mary's, she went on to study History of Art at UEA. Amy loved this course and University as it was one of the few places at that time that studied World Art, including anthropology. She was also lucky enough to study in Venice as part of the degree, and also in Florence in her gap year. Amy went straight into

working in the creative world with Sotheby's, but quickly realised that the 'art' jobs did not seem to be the ones that paid the best. After this, Amy 'yo-yoed' for a few years between PA positions and the more 'arty,' including picture research with a Publisher. Amy realised that if she wanted success and creativity together, she would need to set up her own company (this is not always the right way for everyone however). Whilst working as an interior designer in London, Amy felt there was a real gap in the market for bespoke, high-quality rugs. There seemed to be nothing between the 'off the shelf' rugs at Peter Jones, and those from the Rug Company who were the only bespoke rug company at the time. That was when Amy started, in 2005 at age 27, and ever since has tried to focus on the business and creative side equally: as to succeed in this type of business you need both.
